Dr. Raphaely is a Clinical Professor of Anesthesiology, Jefferson Medical College, Thomas Jefferson University and Co-Director, The Nemours Cardiac Center, Alfred I. duPont Hospital for Children in Wilmington, Delaware. Prior to his appointment in Delaware in 1997, Dr. Raphaely was the Director of the Division of Critical Care Medicine and Associate Director of the Department of Anesthesiology and Critical Care Medicine at The Children's Hospital of Philadelphia.

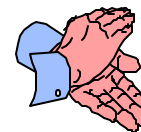
Internationally renowned in his field, Dr. Raphaely has lectured extensively, and has more than 50 publications in the realm of pediatric anesthesia and critical care medicine.

Dr. Raphaely is a member of several professional and scientific societies, including the American Academy of Pediatrics, the American Society of Anesthesiologists, the Society of Critical Care Anesthesiologists, the American College of Critical Care Medicine, and the Society of Critical Care Medicine, for which he served a 20 month term as President, a term longer than any other President.

Dr. Raphaely has served on the editorial boards of the Journal of Pediatrics, Clinical Pediatrics, and Critical Care Medicine, and has been an associate examiner for the American Board of Anesthesiologists.

A graduate of New York Medical College, Dr. Raphaely trained in anesthesiology at the Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania, and in pediatric anesthesiology and critical care medicine at The Children's Hospital of Philadelphia. His clinical interests include heart disease in neonates, infants, children, and adolescents.

Dr. Raphaely and his wife, Marianne, reside in Cherry Hill, New Jersey. They have two sons, Christopher and James, and 5 grandchildren.

International Museum of Surgical Science

While in Chicago, visit the International Museum of Surgical Science, which is hidden inside an old four-story mansion along Lake Shore Drive (1524 North Lake Shore Drive, 312/642-6502, www.imss.org). This vast building is dedicated to the macabre history of medical sciences. Covering over 4,000 years of surgery, this often overlooked museum is the only place in town where you'll find people staring at photographic exhibits of tumors as if they're looking at a Monet painting. In the Hall of the Immortals, a dozen eight-foot statues of great medical heroes, such as Hippocrates and Louis Pasteur, line the room. You'll stumble upon a re-creation of a turn-of-the-century doctor's office, with shelves of rare medical tomes and even postoperative skulls behind glass. Throughout the museum, there's a plethora of tools of the trade: tooth pliers, prongs, probes, squeezers, calipers, and tweezers. The suggested donation is \$5 for adults, \$3 for kids and seniors.

Navy Pier

Navy Pier stretches 3,000 feet out into Lake Michigan. Take a half-mile stroll out to the end to take in some great views of the city and feel the wind off the lake, or check out the many events happening at this popular tourist attraction. Locals enjoy it too.

The Sears Tower

The Sears Tower in Chicago is the tallest building in North America and one of the highest in the world. It soars to 1,454 feet high, with 110 stories. It competes with the Petronas Towers in Malaysia for the title of "Tallest Building in the World," depending on whether it is measured to the architectural top, or the top of the antenna.

The Shedd Aquarium

The Shedd Aquarium's exhibits convey the full scope and complexity of environmental habitats and conservation issues. Naturalistic, experiential exhibits immerse guests in an ecosystem, providing a sense of place where animals live.

The Field Museum of Natural History

With its extensive permanent collection of biological and geological specimens and cultural objects, the Field (for Marshall Field) Museum of Natural History makes a wonderful family outing and is favorite field trip for school children of all ages.
